#### Meet the Path Home team

In reflection of those we serve, more than half—52%—of Path Home's employees identify as BIPOC, 48% identify as LGBTQIA+, 47% have lived experience of homelessness, and 37% have a disability.

Families sleeping outside, in tents, or in cars, got help connecting with mainstream shelter and housing resources.

Families had a safe, warm place to sleep with all the comforts of home – private sleeping space, food, showers, and laundry. Family Village is the first shelter in Oregon to incorporate trauma-informed design and architecture. The design of our shelter provides opportunities for playing, healing, and rebuilding after experiencing homelessness, combined with a wide range of support to move families back into housing and stability.

## housing first

Families experiencing homelessness moved back into housing as quickly as possible. Once housed, Path Home provided rent assistance, case management, and retention services to help families keep their housing. Families created action plans to increase their financial stability, navigate community resources, access medical, mental health, and recovery care, and gain educational and employment opportunities.

### prevention



Families at risk of an eviction kept their housing with flexible and responsive assistance. Path Home provided rent and utility assistance for families facing emergencies that may otherwise lead to homelessness.

Families in the Basic Income Guarantee pilot program received \$575 each month with the goal to increase housing stability. Families reported they used funds for utilities, childcare, medical needs, and food. Offering a guaranteed income allowed these families to decrease financial insecurity, reduce debt, have more time to spend with family, and increase overall wellness and joy.
